#### Lay Person in Charge's Letter

This Chapel is our much-loved place of simple beauty. We, its congregation, drink deeply of its peacefulness and tranquillity and are always eager to share what it gives with all members of the community. It is strange when you think sometimes about a person you have known who has been to Chapel as a visitor or regular worshipper and who has now passed away. They heard, saw and felt the same things as we do and now they do not. The Chapel, however, remains with their memories, and does so apparently unchanged.

Until recently (I write this at the beginning of January 2018) I had only conducted one funeral since my first service here in 2001. Soon I will have conducted three funerals within seven weeks. All three people knew this Chapel in varying degrees.

In November we held the funeral of David Robb Johnstone, a noted and much respected academic, whom I married here to Hazel Devereaux on 2<sup>nd</sup> January 2016. He was a man who but for his prolonged struggle with cancer had fully intended to play an active part in our community's activities.

In December it was our old friend Leighton Jones who passed away, again after a long fight against cancer. Leighton and Muriel, his wife, were energetic and committed Committee members for several years and he was ever handy with his drawing board and tool box. He drew up plans for our literature stand, which miraculously withstood design by committee, constructed our all-important pew top donation box and invented the brass collars for the pulpit candles - to catch the wax. We miss Leighton, and also Muriel, who can no longer make it to Chapel. Our hearts and prayers go out to Muriel and family for their very sad loss. I have written a tribute to Leighton

which is included in this newsletter.

This month we have the funeral of Hilda Dennet who, though not a member of our congregation, so loved Rivington in all its beauty, both obvious and hidden, that her family wished her funeral service to held here in this simple Chapel.

The words in our trust deed about 'Rivington Chapel or Oratory', that it 'be a place of worship and piety' are often in my mind. And whatever else our activities are, whether in fund raising, renovations or day-to-day tasks, it behoves us to remember, always, that our very lives are in effect an act of worship. Do we not sing in our vesper:

Not on this day, O God alone Would we Thy presence seek But fain its hallowing power would own Through all the coming week.

I don't think these are empty words, for while we are ourselves a charity we manage to find ways to help others wherever possible. Also it is accepted by those who know us in the wider community that we are there for them, ready to step up, unconditionally, when called for, in whatever act of worship they need; this could be a Naming Ceremony, Wedding, Relationship Blessing, or Funeral. But the active word in all this is always 'unconditional'.

Over Christmas we were so lucky to enjoy a truly heart-warming and festive carol service. Tanya Smalley rose to the challenge of playing our many carols on the organ, not to mention Jingle Bells as Father Christmas sauntered his way amongst us handing out selection boxes and cheery greetings with gay abandon as he did so. The theme this year was Homelessness, where we explored The Nativity through the perspective of the homeless. Was Jesus not born out doors in a sta-

ble? And were they not refugees in Egypt for a time in their flight from Herod?

We were, thankfully, able to make meaningful contributions to the efforts of 'Coffee4Craig', a charity for the homeless. After our Harvest Festival, in October, the mountain of fresh produce and dry goods that I took down to their base at Centre Point on Oldham Street in Manchester had my car down on its axles. How was I going to unload it all? I needn't have worried, as a small army of helpers appeared and all was carefully unloaded and made ready for immediate use in the kitchen or dispersal in their out-reach efforts.

An unexpected addition this year was an extremely generous donation from a resident of Rivington Village (who wishes to remain anonymous) who donated a PS3 with games and all accessories, mobile phones with chargers, boots, coats and clothing; in previous years they have asked me to pass on sums of money to them. We also gave them the surplus mince pies from our carol service and more groceries that Judith Crompton donated. Chorley Lions had given us a box of new toys to sell for them at our Christmas Craft Fair at the Bay Horse (we collected £22 on their behalf); those that weren't sold we gave to Coffee4Craig. Risha from C4C told me that the PS3, food and the toys were given to a family whom they had been able to house but that had no money for presents or even food as their 'Universal Credit' hadn't arrived in time. The bags of chocolates that weren't needed for the 15 children at our carol service were taken by Judith directly to the children at Derian House.

I mentioned the Craft Fair at the Bay Horse. Karl and Fiona very kindly donated a stall for our use completely free of charge, for which we thank them profusely. This is the third year they have invited us there and we raised £205 despite the rotten weather – we sold 4 to-

boggans! So we're expecting snow sometime soon, please. I must mention that in September, Fiona gave birth to a beautiful girl, Elsie Anne Eccles. Congratulations from all your friends at Rivington Chapel.

We have had a busy last quarter in 2017 and it looks like 2018 is going to be eventful too. One project, which will be discussed at the next Congregational Committee meeting, is the idea of producing a calendar, so over the coming months we are asking everyone to collect favourite photos, articles and pieces to do with Rivington Chapel and its surroundings so that we will have something ready for 2019 and hopefully following years.

Heaven knows, we have to get weaving with regards to funds for Chapel upkeep and maintenance, especially in light of our new heating system, which is improving the worship experience here, not to mention the fabric of the building. We have to say a huge THANK YOU to Michael Hough, Richard Horrocks, Paul and Diane Fairclough and other friends and Trustees who have worked so tirelessly throughout 2017 on our beloved Chapel.

Some of you may not be aware of that I am a Parish Councillor for Rivington and as such I am joined by the other councillors in working on resurrecting the 'Rivington Spring Festival' on the weekend of the 12<sup>th</sup> May. Unfortunately, the Festival did not materialise in 2017, which is such a shame as Rosemary Delamore, who sadly died at the beginning of 2017, and her colleagues worked so hard on getting it established. It's still early days yet but with the right contacts we are hoping to bring back the Maypole and the various stalls and activities on the green that we all enjoyed so much in the past. One councillor, Trevor, is a dab hand with a barbeque, so who knows? Of course, Chapel has always enthusiastically supported this event by opening

its doors to visitors and having modest amounts of crafts and produce and a less modest quantity of . . . fine books available. A less well known fact that I recently discovered is that in the early 1900s the Reverend Samuel Thompson, a minister at this Chapel, was also a Parish Councillor of Rivington - fancy that!

I apologise for this rather long missive but it would be neglectful of me if I failed to mention things which I am aware of and which are a culmination of the efforts and effects of Chapel life. I wish everyone a happy, fulfilled, enlightening and peaceful 2018.

#### Gift Aid

Frank has written in previous newsletters that we can now claim Gift Aid on open collections. This is called the 'Gift Aid small donations scheme' (GASDS). We will be able to do this on small donations up to £20.00 in the current tax year, and will be able to claim for this in the following tax year. GASDS means that for every £10.00 put in the collection, the chapel will be able to claim a further £2.50 from the government. However, as always there is a catch. We can only claim up to 10 times the standard Gift Aid contributions. This means that to claim GASDS, for every £1,000 in the open collection, we must also have claimed for at least £100 in standard Gift Aid.

As you can see, it would be best for as many members of the Chapel as possible to Gift Aid their donations. This will then ensure that we can make the full use of GASDS on the open collections. If you wish to Gift Aid your usual donations, or set up a Standing Order to make regular payments to the Chapel, please see Frank. His contact details are on the back of this Newsletter.

#### **Trustees Matters**

As some of you will have noticed when attending the Chapel during December, all the drain works to the East and South walls have now been completed. The work was carried out within budget with the costs being partly offset by the Hibbert/Gregson Trust award of £3000 announced a year ago. I wish to thank our Honorary Treasurer especially for his efforts in working with the architect with regard to the works specification and for seeking tenders and then working with the contractor.

In addition, our Treasurer, together with Paul Fairclough, has overseen and assisted with the introduction of insulation into the loft area above the Chapel. This work involved the removal of a considerable amount of debris including a number of large bird nests before the wool insulation material could be laid down between the joists. Hopefully, this will ensure that the heat generated by the recently installed new storage heaters will be better contained within the Chapel. We are currently monitoring the indoor temperature of the Chapel in order to ensure that the storage heater programme is maintaining a minimum value required to ensure the Chapel fabric is conserved. This should also enable us to minimise the electricity costs required by these heaters.

With regard to the tearoom repairs, our tenants have had removed the plaster from the South wall interior, thus revealing the underlying stone, which has greatly improved the visual effect for customers. Full re-laying of the gable roof coping stones, which are considered to be the cause of the dampness, will be undertaken when the weather improves.

The state of the flags in the Garden of Remembrance continues to have the attention of the Trustees and possible options to alleviate the problem of their slipperiness in wet weather are under consideration for eventual implementation in the Spring.

#### **Leighton Jones 1937 - 2017**

You can almost hear Leighton say, "Blinkin 'eck, in two weeks, on the 27<sup>th</sup> December, I'll be 80". Though it wasn't to be, it's not to say Leighton didn't have a full, rich, interesting and, maybe in a quiet way, eventful life. A life shared, almost in its entirety, by Muriel. They met when they were just 14 years old, and although they went to separate schools, he to the grammar and she to the secondary, Muriel had him in her sights.

But young love was not without its ups-and-downs. Aged 17, off Leighton went to Weybridge on apprenticeship in the aero-space industry and was only allowed home in the holidays. However, they eventually married at the age of 21 at Horeb Baptist Chapel, Llandud-no Junction, where Muriel had been accepted as an infant and was later baptised by full immersion. Leighton was always supportive of Muriel's Chapel life, though it wasn't really for him.

In 1959 they were able to set up home in Weybridge where Leighton was working for Vickers Armstrong. They lived at Little Sandhurst where their two children Leighton and Susan were born and brought up. They enjoyed caravan holidays which were mostly spent in the New Forest where the family loved to rub shoulders with the wild horses living there and Leighton's love of wild life found full expression.

While at Weybridge Leighton worked on contract in Bristol on Concorde and later on the TSR2 which unfortunately was cancelled. Vickers Armstrong closed and in 1977 Leighton found new work at BAE Salmesbury. So the family upped sticks and moved up to Lancashire. When he finally retired aged 55 in 1992 Leighton's job title was Electrical Inspector.

Leighton had many interests which included trains and planes mainly, but other things such as photography and computers can go on the list as well as model building and carpentry. Leighton drew up the plans for Rivington Chapel's rather fantastic literature display stand and he built a very important item of Chapel furniture . . . the "Visitors Collection Box" no less.

Leighton, you have given us all such a lot to think about - indeed a life well lived.
