#### **Chairman's Letter**

It will soon be time for the Congregational AGM, so please look out for the nomination form for the various committee posts. In addition to the officers, we can have up to seven other members. If anyone is interested in finding out more about what is involved, particularly for the role of Secretary, please ask me or any of the current committee members.

Towards the end of 2018, we bought some additional copies of the hymn book, and people were asked if they would like to sponsor a book and have an acknowledgement or dedication put on the title page. At the time a few people did make a donation, but recently we realised that nothing more had been done to acknowledge the contributions. Vince has now produced some bookplates, so we can proceed with putting them into the hymnbooks. If there is anyone else who would like to sponsor a book, the cost is £10, and forms for recording your dedication are available in Chapel or from Frank Ascroft.

One of the things discussed at the last Committee meeting was how we might make the Chapel more environmentally friendly. As a first step we now have three bins in the kitchen so that we can sort some of our waste on the premises. One bin is for paper and card, one for recyclable plastic, glass and metal, and one for general waste. All the rubbish will still have to be taken away and disposed of in the appropriate domestic waste collection, but it is an improvement on just putting everything into one bin. We also intend to try and make sure that we avoid the use of disposable, single-use items when reusable ones are available.

The 2020 General Assembly Meetings will be from Tuesday 7 to Thursday 9 April at the Birmingham Hilton Metropole Hotel which is close to the NEC. As I will be unable to go this year due to being on holiday that week, it's a good opportunity for another member of the Congregation to attend as the Chapel's delegate and find out more about the part we play in the wider Unitarian movement. The cost of attending (£272, which covers the conference fee, accommodation and meals), will be borne by the Chapel. Applications for registration need to be made by 18 February (although it is possible to book up to 10 March, but there is a £50 late booking fee). We were sad to hear of the death shortly before Christmas of Sylvia Worthington. Although it is some years since she was able to come to Rivington, many will remember her sitting in the pew with Jimmy and Alice Winstanley, and her portrayal of Lady Willoughby when the Chapel was visited by school groups.

#### **Trust Matters**

There is nothing really new to report since the Autumn Newsletter. We are still renegotiating the Tea Room lease on a 10-year basis with our current tenants and once agreed, it will be signed retrospectively to take effect from 1<sup>st</sup> September 2019. With regard to its listed status, because it falls within the curtilage of the Class II\* listed chapel, we are still awaiting the outcome of our application to Historic England for the Tearoom to be "delisted" based on the main criterion that it ceased to have any link with the Chapel's religious activities following closure of the Sunday School in the 1950/60 period.

Michael Hough is stepping down from his current position as Honorary Treasurer, which he has held for the last five years and during which he has guided the Trustees through the 2016 Quinquennial Review and subsequent work undertaken on the various refurbishment projects that have occurred since then. His services have been invaluable and will be sorely missed following the next AGM in March 2020. May I take this opportunity to thank him for all his work and hope that he will be available to give advice when required. During his phasing out period, his duties are being shared with Chris Haighton and David Worsley. We have placed an advert in the Newsletter and on the Chapel website inviting candidates who may wish to be considered for the post from March to apply directly to me. Marge Bradshaw has also circulated the details to appropriate contacts in her wide social media network.

#### **Rivington Chapel Trustees - Honorary Treasurer Required**

Rivington Chapel lies in the centre of the small village of Rivington in Lancashire. Rivington is about 3 miles southwest of Chorley and lies at the foot of the West Pennine Moors, a site of special scientific interest. The chapel itself was built in 1703 and is a grade II\* listed building. It is one of the few chapels still in regular use that have retained the original box pews.

The day to day affairs of the Chapel are run by a congregational committee, but the building itself is the responsibility of the Rivington Chapel Trust\*. The trust is responsible for:

- Maintenance of the chapel buildings
- Maintenance of the chapel grounds
- Supporting the continuation of dissenting worship in the chapel

Although the chapel was originally built for a Presbyterian congregation, at some point it became Unitarian and has remained so ever since. The original 1704 deed only stipulated that the members of the congregation should be dissenting protestants. Further information about the chapel can be found at:

The current treasurer has officially retired from the role but is continuing to assist the trustees until the next AGM in March 2020 or until a replacement is found.

The treasurer's role is unpaid, although reasonable expenses can be reclaimed. Full trustees' meetings are usually held twice a year, with additional ones if required. Most day to day business is undertaken via email and phone calls.

Applicants need not be Unitarians but should have one or more of the following attributes:

- 1. A financial interest or background or previous experience as a treasurer in the voluntary sector.
- 2. Time to undertake the role.
- 3. An interest in volunteering generally.
- 4. An interest in historic buildings.

# **The Chapel Library**

Only a few volumes now remain of a large and once important social resource, originally housed in the former minister's accommodation (kitchen/vestry) prior to the building of the Sunday School.

Quotes from local history writers give some idea of its size and scope:

1904: Wm Fergusson Irvine, 'A short history of Rivington', page 109:

"there is also in connection with the Chapel a good library, containing hundreds of volumes, commenced about the year 1821, by the Rev James Taylor being the principal mover in the matter".

1969: J Rawlinson, 'About Rivington', page 50:

"A library was commenced at the Chapel by the Rev James Taylor in

1821, it was immediately popular and a large number of books were quickly obtained. There were no restrictions on membership. It was open to anyone whatever their creed or practices, and is now housed in the Schoolroom".

1893: T Hampson, 'History of Rivington', page 170:

"The Library in connection with this Chapel was formerly a most noted one throughout the district, and any works of advanced thought, no matter to what particular theology or other school they might belong, were sure to find a resting place here; and youths in the surrounding district could command works from this well managed Library, which were denied them elsewhere".

Over the years the condition of the books deteriorated and in 1985 the library was dispersed, although it would appear that Eddie Tapp (see article in Newsletter May – Jul 2019 – Ed.) may have had a hand in recycling some of them for the 1939 - 45 war effort! Of the remaining volumes, those appropriate to the period were donated in 2014 to Gaskell House in Manchester to restock its own library.

Approx 40 books, most still with the original reference label, have been cleaned and minor repairs carried out - all that remains of the Chapel Library.
