Chairman's Letter

The Rivington Spring Festival on Saturday 12 May will have stalls on the Village Green, although in the case of inclement weather these will be moved to the Parish Hall. We welcome donations of preserves, cakes and any other produce to sell to raise funds for the Chapel. If anyone would like to run a stall, please let the Committee know in plenty of time so that space can be allocated.

The annual Congregational meal will be on Sunday 19 May following our Anniversary Service. The venue has yet to be fixed, so look out for further information on the notice board in Chapel.

The Chapel will again be open for visitors before services over the summer months. If you can spare a couple of hours on one or more of those Sundays, please add your name to the rota on the notice board.

Due to the number of people likely to attend the Walt Whitman Bicentenary Service, the date for the Strawberry Tea has been changed. It will now take place on Sunday 16 June.

We shall be arranging some working parties to start replanting the Physic Garden. If you are interested, please look out for the dates on the notice board. The first of these is likely to be during the week after Easter.

There is a vacant date on the flower rota, Sunday 18 August. If anyone would like to provide the flowers on that day, please let me know.

I am pleased to announce that at the Committee Meeting on Sunday 7 April, Janet Lythgoe was co-opted on to the Committee. This brings the number of members up to six., leaving one place vacant. After several years of representing the Chapel at Manchester District Association meetings, Vince has recently become the MDA's Treasurer. This means that we should appoint another representative from Rivington Chapel to prevent any conflict of interest in matters of funding. If there is any member of the Congregation who would be willing to be our MDA representative, please speak to Vince to find out more about what it would entail.

We would also like to appoint another authorised person for weddings to provide back up for Frank Ascroft in case he is ever unavailable. Please speak to Frank to find out more about what is involved.

Congregational AGM

At the AGM, held this year on Sunday 17 March, there was only one nomination for each of the posts of Chairman and Treasurer, so Alison Whitaker and Frank Ascroft remain in post. There were no nominations for the post of Secretary, so the various duties will continue to be carried out by members of the Committee as necessary, with Vince as correspondence secretary. There were five people nominated for the seven places on the Committee, so all were elected.

A presentation was made to Dennis Crompton who had decided to retire from the Committee. However, he will continue as the Chapel's Publicity Officer. We were pleased to welcome Marilyn Buckley as a new Committee member.

Trust Matters

During the last few months, there have been no new initiatives undertaken by the Trustees and so I can present updates of previously mentioned projects and issues. First of these is to report that the installation of CCTV has been completed and it is now "up and running". Signs to the effect that it is present around the Chapel are in the process of being acquired and displayed.

Michael Hough and Paul Fairclough are continuing their tidying up of the graves and putting down loose chippings. Their work has attracted several positive comments from members of the public.

With regard to the wind damage and destruction caused by the gales in November to the large gable-end window in the Tea Room, we eventually received the disturbing news from our insurers that, because winds on that date were not 45 mph or greater (the normal condition for a storm or gale) and also there were signs of rot in the frame, we cannot claim the costs of its replacement. Because the Tearoom is within the curtilage of the Chapel, which is Class II* listed, repairs and replacements in the Tea Room must be treated as if it too were a classified building. The cost of its exact replacement is considerable and the Trustees are currently challenged with how this might be undertaken during the foreseeable future. However, our tenant is happy to continue her business with the temporary repair in place for some time.

We have at last received formal notice that the Garden of Remembrance is now registered in our name with the Land Registry. However, we are still awaiting a reply from United Utilities regarding our request for a possible renewal of the previous licence for the land outside the immediate area that has been transferred to us. Of interest to the Village Green and our immediate surroundings is the development of a 3-year plan by Rivington Parish Council and we are looking forward to working with them to achieve this in conjunction with our own plans for enhancing the character of the Chapel estate. As part of these, during 2019 we hope to be able to resurface and extend the car parking area outside the Chapel gate.

Finally, the lease for the Tearoom is coming up for renewal and we are consulting with our tenant during the process and taking professional advice regarding an advisable rent to be charged under the proposed renewal terms.

However, Michael now feels that the time has come for him to be stepping back from the role of treasurer, maybe not in the very short term, but definitely in the medium term. None of the current Trustees who have the time feel they are qualified to take on the role and so we are asking if anyone would like to join the Trustees and become the treasurer. As Michael will not be stepping down immediately, any prospective new treasurer will be able to work alongside him before taking on the role. Chris Haighton is also a trustee and could advise if necessary.

Memories of Rivington part two

During the war, one thing the government asked everyone to do was to 'Dig for Victory' and I remember Mr Whitehead (the headteacher) telling us that he had dug up his lawn and planted vegetables. We also had a garden in the school grounds where I remember growing potatoes and other vegetables. When we harvested them we weighed them and calculated their value in pounds, shillings and pence. All very good for one's arithmetic!

In addition, we were asked to collect as much paper as we could and were awarded with badges of sergeant or captain according to the weight we collected. Someone from the Chapel told Mr Whitehead that there were a lot of books in the Chapel that we could have so several of us came up to the Chapel schoolroom to collect them. As a lover of old books now I hate to think of the ones from the Chapel that were lost to help the war effort.

During the war there were constant worries about German parachutists dropping on the moors near Rivington. Consequently all the road signs were removed and the words on the stone indicating the boundary between Anderton and Rivington were obliterated.

Related to this is the memory of my cousin, who also lived in Major Bottoms, coming home from Church and complaining that some stupid young men in the Home Guard, whom she had known from childhood, had stopped her at a barrier on the road entering Rivington and would not let her pass until she had shown her Identification Card.
