Lay Person in Charge's Letter

Firstly, I would like to thank and congratulate everyone who worked so hard and tirelessly on our Triennial Pilgrimage on 27 September. It was a triumph and did you and the Chapel proud. There was a great attendance of Unitarians from far and wide and it was a joy to see so many, both old faces and new.

Today, 25 October, I, along with Judith and our chairman Alison, attended Tina Ghandi's ordination at Walmsley Chapel, Egerton, where we witnessed a truly moving and special occasion. Every detail was assiduously covered and all were made to feel welcome and a part of this significant ceremony.

After these two events one can only feel the strongest of winds in the sails of our faith, and our importance as a tolerant, nurturing and inclusive faith has never been more vital and needed in a fractured and wayward world.

And now for something completely different; as a Rivington Parish Councillor for some years now (Rev Samuel Thompson was also a councillor over a hundred years ago), I know that one of our perennial problems has been with traffic, parking and antisocial behaviour. Here is a copy of my part in a submission we recently made to Lancashire Highways Department:

This Sunday lunchtime, 21 Sept 2025, I was in our church yard overlooking Sheephouse Lane, directing half a dozen cars back down, as the road was jammed. Nothing new, as 30 years ago Bill Jones, who lived in the post office, was doing the same.

The point is that nothing but radical change will make a difference.

We obviously need parking to be restricted at these 'choke' points.

Importantly, we have elderly folk and those with restricted mobility attending our two churches throughout Sunday and these roads are perilous. Also, Duke of Edinburgh Award youths, laden with bulky rucksacks, traverse the area at all times and, like the elderly, their mobility is restricted if there are fast moving vehicles.

The tranquility that is sought in the area is severely impinged upon by souped-up bikes and cars that create a racket. This is insufferable for residents. David's call for speed bumps would, I feel, make a marked

difference for the better regarding anti-social use of the roads.

Paid parking would no doubt create a good deal of problems for residents as the urge to leave cars in very inconvenient places would escalate. The knock-on effect MUST be taken into consideration and not conveniently brushed over.

Last but not least, we must remember at all times that Lever Park is a place bequeathed to the people for rest and recuperation.

So, it's not all a bed of roses, but at least there is some weeding going on.

Soon we will be entering the festivities of Yule and I would like to point out that there are two Christmas fairs taking place in Chapel towards the end of November and a Parish Carol Service in Chapel at 7pm on Wednesday 10th December when there will be a brass band, mulled cider, hot Vimto, mince pies, a quiz and lots of carols. Keep your voices together though, because it's our Carol Service at 2:15pm on Sunday 21st December. Don't miss these; come and sing in jubilation.

I would also like to endorse Vince's words about Tina Ghandi's ordination service. In celebration of her Hindu heritage, Tina wore a sari, and there were some traditional prayers in Sanskrit. The service was led by Rev Ant Howe, Ministry Tutor at Unitarian College, and there were contributions from other ministry students. Several ministers from various parts of the country were there and music was provided by the Chowbent Choir. Tina is going to serve as Minister at Chowbent.

Trustees Matters

Since the last newsletter, the Trustees have received the Heritage Statement for the Chapel building as a prerequisite to being fully able to plan for the proposed modifications to the vestry, which, hopefully, will:

- a) Introduce a toilet with disabled access to the kitchen area,
- b) Improve the doorway between the chapel and the vestry and so enable wheelchair access, and
- c) Improve access to the first floor so that better use may be made of the space, with meetings being of a principal focus here.

At the present time, given receipt of the architect's sketches of two plans that attempt to address these objectives, we are currently seeking a meeting with Historic England in order to discuss the feasibility of either of these prior to applying for Listed Building Consent and the creation of formal plans for submission to Chorley Council for their approval.

With regard to disabled access, we are currently working with a temporary ramp provider with a view to enabling wheelchair access via the right-hand door on the west wall. It is hoped to have a decision within the coming weeks regarding its design and purchase.

A full tree audit has been undertaken across the estate with a priority list of actions to be undertaken. These are currently being costed and some will be effected before winter fully sets in.

Finally, so that the Chapel may be hired out for events with a greater degree of economic confidence, an 'Open Hours' hourly costing rate is currently being calculated which may be used by both the Trustees and the Congregational Committee to ensure that all costs are fully



covered when events are being arranged in the Chapel and costed accordingly.

At the last AGM, your chairman, who has been in post for 10 years now, signalled his intention to stand down, while retaining his membership of the Trustees, at the AGM in March 2026 and so volunteers are being sought both from within the current Trustee body as well as externally.


