

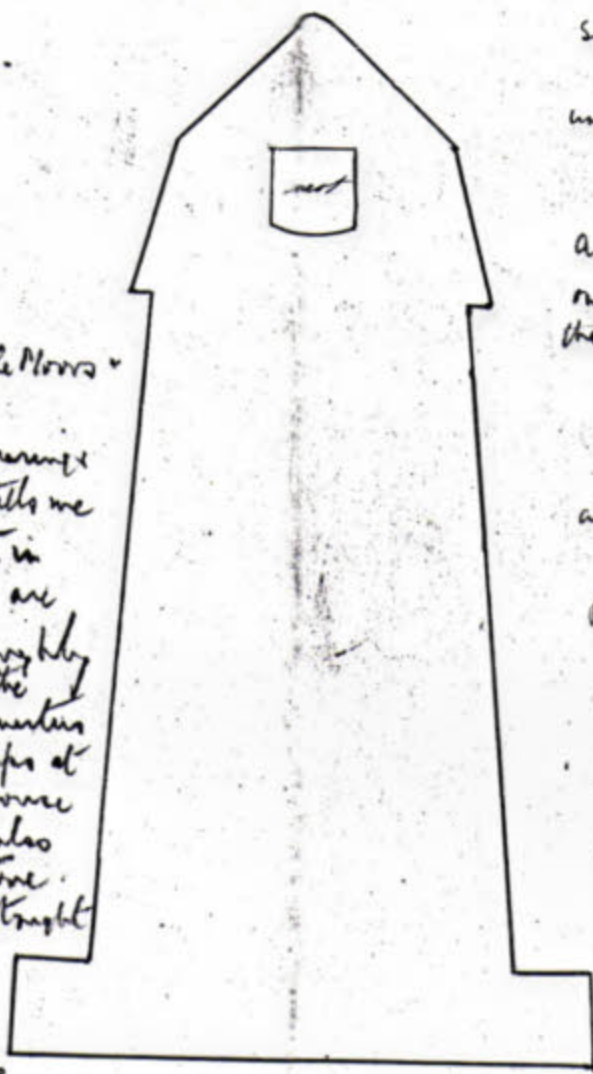

copy of letter to Mr John Shaw
Risington, Bolton Moor
"Wigan 20th Dec 1805"

Dear Sir / I beg to inform you that the memorial bearings
are nearly finished, & the artist Mr Magnall tells me
that he will have them at my house complete in
about a fortnight, the part that I have seen are
splendid, he is preparing the horns of Willoughby
Whittle, Halkinwell, Leigh, Egerton, & Worsley - the
Crown & Savasens Head for the top and then he quarters
them again & place them along with his horns tops at
the bottom - which he pledges to have at my house
complete next Friday week. The sculptor is also
at work placing the inscription upon the stone
which is expected to be complete in about a fortnight

eldest son 12th Lord, died, June 1712 aged 75; Also of Anne his
Lordship's first wife, who died, in 1690 aged 52; Likewise, ^{the} Lady
Honora his second wife, eldest daughter of ^{see Foster's Red. of these families for insertion of Egerton} Lord Leigh of Stoneleigh,
(named Dec 1691) had 1 son & 3 daughters
and relict of Sir William Egerton of Worsley, Knight of the Bath,

daughter of his grace the Duke of Newcastle, she died in 1730 aged 77;
